Minister's Greetings

Greetings!

In preface to his epic poem "Light of Asia" published in 1879, Sir Edwin Arnold says this about Buddhism:

"Prince Siddhartha Gautama, the founder of Buddhism was born in 640 BCE. Most other creeds are youthful compared to this venerable religion, which has in it the entity of universal hope, the immortality of a boundless love, and an indestructible ele-

ment of faith in final good, and is the proudest assertation ever made of human freedom".

The Buddha, declared himself, even when on the threshold of Nirvana, to be only what all other men might become. Throughout Asia and now the world, forests of flowers are laid upon shrines, and countless millions of lips daily repeat the words "I take refuge in Buddha".

This month we celebrate Hanamatsuri "Japanese flower festival" along with the celebration of the Buddha's birth. The original purpose of the Hanamatsuri festival was to encourage flowers such as the cherry blossom to stay in bloom. The idea being that the longer the blossoms stayed in bloom the more prosperous the harvest would be. This in itself being a message of hope.

In celebrating Shakyamuni Buddha's birthday, we pay tribute to the man who according to our Jodo Shinshu tradition, "appeared in this world solely to teach the ocean-like Primal Vow of Amida Buddha".

Since Sir Arnold wrote his poem, there have been two world wars and three pandemics all of which killed millions upon millions of people worldwide.

During this current scourge that is sweeping the globe, our leaders are encouraging us to keep ourselves clean by washing our hands often, avoid crowds and maintain social distancing to keep the virus from spreading and be calm not give in to panic. In addition, we should be self-reliant and take responsibility for ourselves and those close to us. Following these basic guidelines should keep our bodies healthy and keep us safe from the coronavirus.

At the end of his life, The Buddha gave this advice: "be islands unto yourselves, refuges unto yourselves, seeking no external refuge; with the Dhamma as your island, the Dhamma as your refuge, seeking no other refuge." The advice here is simple yet profound. "Be islands unto yourselves" reflects the self-reliant approach we as practicing Buddhists should take for our spiritual as well as our physical well-being.

From the Nirvana Sutra:

If there are beings who offer a piece of incense

And scatter a blossom before the three treasures of Buddha,

Dharma, and Sangha,

They will give rise to a mind resolute and fearless,

Which cannot be defeated even by all the maras....(demons)

Greetings from the Chairman!

First, I want to thank everyone for their understanding and cooperation regarding the temporary shutdown of Temple activities during the coronavirus pandemic. I know it is a hardship for everyone. However, the shutdown of Temple activities is necessary to preserve the health of our Sangha as well as its surrounding communities. Regarding the length of the shutdown, no one knows for certain. Most authorities believe it may be several weeks or even months before things will get back to normal. The Board will meet next week to determine future suspensions. However, I believe that it is probable that Temple activities will continue to be suspended

throughout the month of April and perhaps into May. Consequently, it is also probable that the Spring Bloom Day/plant sale will be canceled. During this time, Reverend Warrick will continue to be available via telephone at (253 833 1442) for questions, consultations or advice. Please check the temple website www.wrbt.org and social media accounts for updates.

We have also received some guidance from BCA regarding funerals and memorial services. Since the Center for Disease Control (CDC) has indicated that gatherings of more than 50 persons are discouraged, if a funeral or service cannot be postponed, it should be limited to a small, private service for immediate family only.

Finally, I would like to thank Kendall Kosai for coordinating the initial temple shutdown and Board meeting during the time I was on vacation in Arizona.
