



### **Minister's Greetings**

Greetings,

Well, here we are in June still hoping desperately that this coronavirus pandemic will soon be over and we can get back to some sort of normalcy.

The month of June reminds us of summer and the clear skies and the warmth of the sun.

In 2020, the Summer Solstice is Saturday, June 20 here in the Northern Hemisphere, the day when Earth arrives at the point in its orbit where the North Pole is at its maximum tilt toward the Sun, resulting in the longest day and shortest night of the calendar year.

With the easing of the pandemic restrictions, we are hoping to have our annual Sunrise Summer Solstice Sit. Being that it is outside, social distancing should be easier and safer. Let's keep our fingers crossed.

There is a term called, June Bug, which is given to many large bugs found in the United States, during May and June. The bugs get this name because the transition of larva to adult happens in this month. These bugs are usually seen in the dark when they are attracted to light.

During the warm days of June, in my youth, I remember we would play outside until darkness fell catching June bugs. Regrettably I also remember tying a string to their legs, having my own bug on a leash. When I was very young, folks used to say "why he is no bigger than a June bug". When I think about those times, I miss them. Just as I miss our recent "normal" times here at the temple.

These days I hear a lot about getting back to normal. Folks lament the past normal when we seemed more carefree. We are afraid and worry about what the future may bring as the new normal. We must not cling to these types of thoughts; we must let them go. But letting go can be a really painful part of life. We are taught that we must let go of these types of attachments and desires if we are to experience happiness.

Buddhism offers many paths to liberation. Shinran points us toward the Pure Land way when he says:

The dharma-gates, each distinct, number eighty-four thousand,

But the keen blade for severing ignorance, its effects, and the karmic causes of suffering,

Is the Name of Amida:

In a single utterance, one's karmic evil is completely swept away.

Gone are countless traces of past karma and the designing thoughts arising from them;

Even without being instructed, we turn and enter the gate of suchness.

So, come on let's get outside, get some (rare) sunshine and enjoy our current suchness (reality) whatever its, as much as we can.

# Greetings from the Chairman!

Hello, temple members!! I hope that you are all doing well and able to keep busy during this "stay at home" time. One positive note is that I have been able to catch up on my gardening. It looks like a good year for blueberries, cherries, and asparagus.

Getting back to Temple business, it has now been over two months since we held our last in-person Sunday service and nearly eight weeks since Governor Inslee issued his statewide "stay at home" order. In compliance with that order, the Temple Board suspended Temple Sunday services and has now extended that suspension

through Sunday, July 12. The Board also cancelled Memorial Day cemetery services and this year's Bon Odori community event. However, Kendall Kosai is chairing a committee to look into the possibility of a smaller and limited alternative event.

If you are wondering when Temple activities will resume, the Board has formed a Re-start committee that will guide the Board on the process. However, it is anticipated that a Temple re-start will largely be based on Governor Inslee's 4-phased re-opening guidelines for individual counties. Currently, we are in Phase One. Phase one was implemented on May 5, 2020 and will continue for a 3-week evaluation period. It does not allow group gatherings but does allow essential businesses and essential travel. High risk individuals (Health risk individuals or anyone over 65) are advised to "stay at home." Phase two, if the spread rates and hospitalization rates are ok, is anticipated to be implemented on the 1<sup>st</sup> of June . Phase two allows all outdoor activities involving not more than 5 persons. It also allows social and spiritual gatherings of not more than five persons outside of the household once per week with physical distancing (6 feet between individuals). It allows limited non-essential travel and opens more businesses, including restaurants at 50%. High risk individuals are advised to "stay at home." Phase three, if the spread rates and hospitalization rates remain good, could possibly be implemented on June 23. More outdoor activities are allowed and social and religious gatherings up to 50 people are allowed with physical distancing. Non-essential travel is ok. More business activities are opened with some restrictions. High risk individuals are still advised to "stay at home." Phase four, essentially opens everything back up, with physical distancing and clean hygiene. High risk individuals may resume participation with physical distancing. Most believe that Phase four will not be implemented until a vaccine is discovered, which is expected sometime in 2021.

The Temple Board will meet on July 8<sup>th</sup> and if King County has progressed to Phase three, it will decide whether to resume services and under what conditions. The Board will consider Governor Inslee's "reopening process", recent guidelines issued by the BCA, and input from members when making its decision. So, please let us know what you think. reokimoto@comcast.net

Although, we are hopeful, that the Temple will be able to re-open in July, safety comes first and cannot be rushed. Even after re-opening, services will likely be held on a more limited and restricted basis. BCA guidelines suggest smaller gatherings at first with gradual increases. Physical distancing policies, disinfections of chairs and tables before and after service, and the use of facemasks will be mandatory.

In the meantime, stay safe and stay at home!
