Minister's Greetings

Greetings,

Well here it is July again.

At WRBT most of us when we think July, we think Obon and Bon Odori. There is always a great deal of planning and work that goes into our annual Bon Odori Festival. Much eating, drinking and dancing goes on during the festive atmosphere at our celebration. Obon too is a time for homecomings, visiting family gravesites, story-

telling and decorating the temple.

Legend has it that at the start of Obon, the spirits of our relatives and ancestors come back to the physical world and visit us. Afterward we hang lanterns to help guide them back to their world.

Our Obon has deep cultural and religious roots but is primarily a Buddhist celebration. Buddhism teaches us that all things are interconnected and interdependent. That is everything on earth from humans, animals, nature, the elements including the spirits. At Obon we give honor and express our gratitude not only to our immediate relatives who have recently passed away but also to our earliest human ancestors who lived decades, centuries and millenniums ago.


The origin of Obon is believed to come from the Urabon sutra, which tells the story of Mokuren, who envisions his recently deceased mother suffering in a hell-like realm because of her selfish affection for him above all others. Being distressed he asked for The Buddha's help. The Buddha advised him to make offerings to monks in his mother's memory, which he does, after which his mother is liberated to the Pure Land. Mokuren's heart fills with joy and he begins dancing. This "dance of joy" becomes Bon Odori which spread all over japan in the Kamakura period.

Through natural disasters and manmade ones our Bon Odori festival has been a tradition celebrated for over 500 years. This year will be our 51st year at WRBT.

However, this year, due to the Pandemic, we are not able to assemble in large crowds. So, sadly we will not be able to all be together at one time as in the past. Our temple leaders are working hard to find ways that we can preserve this important celebration of our loved ones and our history this year and on into the future. By holding tightly to our Nembutsu teaching we will all be able to dance Mokuren's "dance of joy" in our hearts even though we all might not be physically together.

Greetings from the Chairman!

Hello, temple members!! I hope that you are all doing well and able to keep busy during this "stay at home" time. Remember, high health risk individuals and anyone 65 and over are advised to stay at home until Phase IV is achieved This seems likely to be sometime next year.

Getting back to Temple business, it has now been over three months since we held our last in-person Sunday service and nearly 12 weeks since Governor Inslee issued his statewide "stay at home" order. If you are wondering when Temple services will resume, the Board has formed a Re-start committee that will guide the Board on

the process. However, it is anticipated that a Temple re-start will be based on Governor Inslee's 4-phased re-opening guidelines for individual counties. Currently, King County is in Phase 1A. **Phase 1A** was implemented on June 5, 2020. It allows outdoor service up to 100 participants, provided that all reopening

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guidelines are met. King County has recently applied to advance to **Phase two** in the re-opening process. Phase two allows indoor services at a place of worship with up to 25% capacity or 50 individuals, whichever is less. However, Governor Inslie's guidelines require that before reopening, all churches must develop a Comprehensive COVID-19 Exposure Control, Mitigation and Recovery Plan. Because that plan was being developed and had not been approved, the Board decided put safety first and cancel a planned outdoor Solstice service rather than rush through the process.

The Temple Board will meet on July 8th and if King County has progressed to Phase two, the Board will decide whether and when to resume services and under what conditions. The Board will consider Governor Inslee's "re-opening process", recent guidelines issued by the BCA, and input from members when making its decision. So, please let us know what you think. reokimoto@comcast.net

Although, we are hopeful, that the Temple will be able to re-open in late July, safety comes first and cannot be rushed. Even after re-opening, services will likely be held on a more limited and restricted basis. BCA guidelines suggest smaller gatherings at first with gradual increases. Physical distancing policies, disinfections of chairs and tables before and after service, and the use of facemasks will be mandatory.

In the meantime, stay safe, stay at home or WEAR A MASK!

Restart Committee Report:

The Restart Committee met on June 8, 2020. Norma reported that we have 40-50 facemasks in the process of being fabricated. If you would be willing to sew a facemask, please contact Norma williamgeenty@comcast.net or (253 840 4386), who is coordinating the production and distribution of facemasks for the temple. We would greatly appreciate your sharing your talents.

If anyone needs one or two (it can be used for any activity, not just for services) contact Norma. The committee is reviewing Governor Inslee's Re-start process and guidelines and is in the process of drafting a required Safe Work Plan and a Comprehensive COVID-19 Exposure Control, Mitigation and Recovery Plan for approval by the Board. It is very comprehensive and will require the purchase of some additional equipment, including temperature thermometers, face shields, and some protective equipment. We will also have to recruit and train some COVID-19 leads to supervise any on-site temple gatherings and also volunteers to perform regular cleaning and sanitizing before, during and after the event. So, if you are interested in volunteering for these critical re-opening positions, please contact me at reokimoto@comcast.net. We will not be able to reopen without performing these necessary safety activities.

A STUDY OF ŌJŌ IN SHIN BUDDHIST THOUGHT



Special Guest Speaker: **Rev. Dr. David Matsumoto** President, Institute of Buddhist Studies

These lectures will examine the significance of 往生ōjō ("birth") in Shin Buddhist thought. A brief survey of notions of "birth in the Pure Land" in Buddhist scriptures and commentaries will serve as a backdrop for a detailed study of the innovative perspectives and insights on ōjō in Shinran Shōnin's writings. Later commentaries and interpretations of Shinran's thought will also be considered.

*LECTURE ONE:

Sat., July 18, 11 am- 1 pm (PDT)

A survey of the foundations of Mahāyāna Buddhist thought and the development of the notion of "birth in the Pure Land" in Pure Land Buddhist scriptures and commentaries. A close reading of the *True Teaching, Practice* and *Realization* and other writings of Shinran Shōnin that will demonstrate the doctrinal and religious significance of his perspective on ōjō.

*LECTURE TWO:

Sat., July 25, 11 am - 1 pm (PDT)

A survey of commentaries that will reveal a range of interpretations on Shinran's teaching of õjō – including thinkers from the Hongwanji and Õtani branches of Shin Buddhism and other religious traditions.

Required text: Collected Works of Shinran, Vols. I & II.
