

It has now been over five months since we held our last in-person Sunday service. When in-person Sunday services will resume remains a question but in light of recent King County Covid 19 infection rates, it doesn't appear to be anytime soon. Much depends on when a vaccine becomes available. The Temple

Board's Restart Committee met on August 20, 2020 and after much discussion, decided that it will recommend to the Board during its September 9th meeting that: 1: Sunday in-person services be suspended indefinitely; 2: that the Fall Bazaar be either cancelled or significantly modified to reduce in-person contact (similar to the Obon) and 3: that the Temple begin streaming virtual services twice monthly beginning in September. If you have any questions or concerns about any of the Restart Committee's recommendations, please contact any Board member.

We encourage all members to seek help from younger more tech-savvy family members so they can view virtual services. Temple Statement

Over the past several weeks, we have seen a groundswell movement for racial justice that has brought a moment of self-reflection upon our own Temple and how we can be a better Sangha. As a Temple that has faced racial prejudice and discrimination, we hold a unique responsibility to be allies for those who are suffering the same - a moral obligation to speak out. Unfortunately, for too long, this equality has not existed in society and that is why we believe that Black lives matter.

This moment is not lost upon us as we all have a role to play in educating ourselves, supporting our community, and providing a space for the Buddha Dharma. We can be better and must be better. As foolish beings, we do not have all the answers, but we are committed to examining our own biases, promoting diverse experiences, and fostering a more welcoming place for all people. We will continue to live the Eightfold Path to make our world a better place for all seeking change on a societal, institutional, and individual level.

It was felt that the Temple needed to make a statement about the racial injustice that has been happening for far too long. 
