Minister's Greetings

Greetings,

Well, here we are in June. Across our country there will be many students graduating from either High School or college this month.

With seven grandchildren, it seems like every June Rona and I have someone graduating. Because of her Polynesian upbringing, Rona likes to give the lei. Giving a lei is a great way to show friendship, love or to celebrate or honor someone. It is also a

useful gift for greeting someone warmly. Giving a lei to a graduate is a beautiful way to show love and admiration for them. Sometimes it can also represent good luck for the future. A lei is usually made of flowers, but we make our lei out of money and give them as gifts when each of our grandchildren graduate.

When we first started making the lei out of money, we wanted to use only relatively new bills. But this creates a lot of work for the tellers at the bank. They would go through several stacks of bill looking for the crisp notes. Eventually we realized it was too much to try and get the newer ones, so we started using all the bills as we received them. Wrinkled, written on, crumpled or new we used all of them.

When I think of the bills used in that way, I think that they are just like the human race. Each bill could represent an entire culture, ethnic group, nation or even more. However, there is a part of the

lei which is not easily seen that is also vital. The string or twine which connects each bill to all the other

bills and thus giving the lei its beautiful shape and form is also an especially important part of the lei.

The string represents the teaching/dharma of interdependence that we are all interconnected and interrelated. One bill does not make a lei. For a lei, we need each other (all the bills, beads and string) and only when we come together do we have a beautiful lei.

We might be a little different and little worn but we; as with the bills have the same value.

Our teacher, Shinran speaks to that value when he reminds us that the Primal Vow of Amida makes no distinction between people young and old, good and evil. For it is the Vow to save the person whose karmic evil is deep and grave and whose blind passions abound. He reminds us that all beings are welcomed to his Pure Land, just as they are.

To all graduates, congratulations. You have just finished and important chapter in your life and now you are ready to begin the next one.

Hello, temple members.

The month of June brings the summer solstice and warmer weather. It is a time for tending to plants and nurturing the garden. It is a time for outdoor activity.

It has now been 14 months since we held our last in-person Sunday service. The percentage of persons having been inoculated with a very safe and effective Covid-19 vaccine increases every week. At the time of writing this, approximately 57% of King County residents have been fully vaccinated. The CDC recently issued an advi-

sory that fully vaccinated individuals incur only minimal risk of infection from socially distanced outdoor activity. Consequently, the White River Temple Board has authorized some initial steps in what we hope will be a re-opening process. The first event at the Temple will be the Summer Solstice Sit on June 19th.

The first guideline is that all participants must sign up in advance online at www.wrbt.org/summersolstice or by contacting the office - office@wrbt.org or 253-833-1442. All attendees must provide contact information prior to attendance. There will be a limit on the number of attendees so please sign up as soon as possible. Other restrictions include completion of a screening questionnaire, masks at all times, social distancing, and no physical interaction with other households. Although we will not be checking vaccination cards, it is requested for the safety of others, that only fully vaccinated individuals sign up to attend. A full list of guidelines will be posted on our website.

Finally, I encourage everyone to sign up to be vaccinated. It does not hurt, and it is the only way we can reduce community spread enough to fully re-open the temple. Hopefully, that will be sometime this summer.

In the meantime, stay safe, stay at home, wear a mask, and GET VACCINATED!



You read the article from Debbie Christian, Director, Auburn Food Bank in the May newsletter.



Yes, that's right! 5 AM in the morning, because sunrise on that day is 05:11 a.m.

All of life on planet Earth begins to awaken as the Sun's early rays begin to fall upon the planet. The atmosphere is highly charged and provides the essential food to all living organisms in nature. Being still and quieting the mind at this auspicious time of day can be transformational on a spiritual level.
