Minister's Greetings

Hello White River Buddhist Temple! My name is Rev. Cyndi Yasaki and I am honored to be your resident minister. I look forward to making connections with you all and creating a Sangha that is interested in learning and spreading the Dharma within and outside the temple. As my introduction to you all I would like to discuss the topic of Names.

The name given to me by my parents, Cynthia, is Greek in origin and means "From Mount Kynthos". Mount Kynthos was the mountain Artemis, the Greek goddess, was born on. Those born with the name Cynthia will stand tall during challenging times. The Dharma Name given to me by Bishop Ogui when I participated in the Youth Minister's Assistant Program is Shaku Jikaku. Shaku is the name all Buddhists receive upon being given a Dharma Name and means of the Śākya clan or a disciple of Śākyamuni Buddha. The name Jikaku means "Compassion Awakening". The above names were given to me, and I believe hold a hope for me from my parents and the BCA, respectively.

The Buddha named Amida translates to "without meter", "immeasurable", or "infinite" and is understood to have the names Amitayus (Infinite Life) and Amitabha (Infinite Light). Amida Buddha perfected vows to save all sentient beings from the cycle of birth and death. This means, in saying the Nembutsu, Namo Amida Butsu, not only are we taking refuge in Amida Buddha, but we are also taking refuge in the Eighteenth Vow which states that all sentient beings who take refuge in Amida Buddha break free of the cycle of birth and death and are born in Amida Buddha's Pure Land. So, say Namo Amida Butsu in gratitude to the infinite wisdom and compassion contained within the name of the Buddha who has vowed to save all sentient beings.

The news we've all been waiting for is here. As of November 1st, Reverend Cynthia Yasaki will officially start as the resident minister at White River Buddhist Temple! We are extremely pleased to have her talents and wisdom join our growing Sangha. As this will be Rev. 

Last Night at the Telegraph Club By Malinda Lo



Here he is cared for by Matsu, a reticent housekeeper and a master gardener. Over the course of a remarkable year, Stephen learns Matsu's secret and gains not only physical strength, but also profound spiritual insight. Matsu is a samurai of the soul, a man devoted to doing good and finding beauty in a cruel and arbitrary world, and Stephen is a noble student, learning to appreciate Matsu's generous and nurturing way of life and to love Matsu's soulmate, gentle Sachi, a woman afflicted with leprosy.


