

Dues will be collected starting in January 2023. Annual WR BWA are now \$20/year. The \$5 increase was approved at the General meeting.


The WR BWA gratefully acknowledges donations from Sharon Kosai and Darlene Yamada.

The Auburn Food Bank's Ray of Hope offers a drop-in center for homeless individuals in the Auburn area. Laundry and shower facilities are offered on select days. Breakfast, lunch, and dinner is served every day. Dinner is served at 5 pm. Individuals at the Ray are moving into their own apartments with the help of housing vouchers. King County purchased the former Clarion Inn and will be managed by Compass Housing Alliance. This will give a percentage of the homeless in Auburn an apartment of their own and with a variety of services including employment, and referrals to mental health and substance abuse treatment. The former Clarion is being renovated at this time.
