Minister's Greetings

I would like to continue the topic of why we say or think, "itadakimasu" and "gochisou sama deshita" before and after every meal. Why it is important for us to thank everyone and every being that gave up their life or used energy so that we can have our meal. This month, the world observes Earth Day on April 22 to think upon the many environmental issues that hurt our planet. I thought I would touch on the topic of octopus farms.

Last year, it was announced that the world's first octopus farm will be built in Mexico sometime in 2023. As someone who loves getting Takoyaki from Kizuki Ramen, I thought that it would be a good idea to mass produce octopus for the consumption of this being. Unfortunately, many people agree that though it would help with the accessibility of octopus, like fish farms, the lifestyle of the being would be dramatically decreased compared to their ocean living counterparts. The octopuses would be forced to reproduce as often as possible meaning that more females would be forced to live shorter lives and those chosen to be "farmed" would have to live in overpopulated tanks. How horrible is this for a being to live?

A year before the announcement of the first octopus farm, the United Kingdom recognized octopuses, as well as crabs and lobsters, as sentient beings. Though this law does not change anything about the consumption of the beings, it does make us all stop to think about consuming other sentient beings.

Jodo Shinshu does not force us to be on strict diets nor does it command us to eat certain foods. But this teaching does allow us to reflect on not only ourselves, but the lives of all the beings around us. This includes sentient beings like the octopus who give their lives for us to eat delicious Takoyaki. This is why we say and think, "itadakimasu" and "gochisou sama deshita" before and after every meal. It is to remind us that our lives are not just ours, that we live in a world in which we have to consume the lives of other beings to live. So please say or think "itadakimasu" and "gochisou sama deshita" in gratitude to the wisdom and compassion shown to us by all these beings.

Behold The Dreamers by Imbolo Mbue



When the financial world is rocked by the collapse of Lehman Brothers, the Jongas are desperate to keep Jende's job—even as their marriage threatens to fall apart. As all four lives are dramatically upended, Jende and Neni are forced to make an impossible choice.
