## **Minister's Greetings**

Happy Pride Month!

This month it is important in our Jodo Shinshu community to highlight that our teachings are for everyone, regardless of a person's gender identity or sexual identity.

Some people in society might label me as a female who has always stayed "between the lines" because I am married to a man (who I love very much). But I identify myself as a cis heterosexual female who has explored my own sexual and gender identity through-

out my life and have found that the line between identifying oneself as gender fluid, bisexual, pansexual, etcetera is often blurry and that this is okay.

It is hard to not put labels on people when we go out. It is the reason why some people get angry when these labels do not conform to their own thinking. For example, when we go to the mall and assume two passing people are friends but we see them later showing signs of affection to each other, or we go to the restroom and we see a trans person in the gendered restroom they identify with.

Though it is tough for some people to do, we, ourselves, have to realize that we need to try to let go of our own automatic labeling of other people. This will allow us to see the people around us just as they are.

Because we are human beings with clouded vision who cannot completely let go of these labels and are often focused on our own expectations, we turn to Amida Buddha's Infinite Wisdom and Compassion. Amida Buddha sees us just as we are; no matter how we identity ourselves. Though we are not an enlightened being like Amida Buddha, we can listen to their call of wisdom and compassion and try our best to lessen the suffering we inflict upon ourselves and others by clearing our own vision to see people as they would like to be accepted.

So take refuge in Amida Buddha, the Buddha who accepts us as we are.



#### White River Book Club

There is Nothing For You Here by Fiona Hill June 18 @ 7pm

A celebrated foreign policy expert and key impeachment witness, Fiona Hill, reveals how declining opportunity has set America on the grim path of modern Russia—and draws on her personal journey out of poverty, as well as her unique perspectives as an historian and policy maker, to show how we can return hope to our forgotten places.

Hill speaks of her beginnings as a coalminer's daughter from northern England. She describes the turmoil and corruption inside the White House. She answers the question, "How did you get there?"

The book is a long, thoughtful answer to that question. It takes in the story of industrial and political rot in three nations: the UK, the country of her birth; the

US, the country of her choosing; and Russia, the object of her lifelong vocation.

The powerful currents driving the modern history of those three states carried her on her remarkable life's journey. The state-assisted euthanasia of the British coal industry in the early 80s drove her from her home town of Bishop Auckland, where her family had been miners. Trump's former Russia adviser charts her journey from County Durham to DC, showing how populism thrives when communities are abandoned. It explains that only by expanding opportunity can we save our democracy.

## **Unforgettable - The Lotus Skyliners Story**

A piece of local history is appearing June 11 from 3-5 PM, at the Seattle Betsuin Buddhist Temple.

A newly released book: "The Lotus Skyliners — How a Big Band Lifts Up a Small Community" tells the

story of an unforgettable group of Japanese American musicians after World War II. A committee of five former Lotus Skyliners and four volunteers collaborated to help create the book over the past three years.

From 1953 to 1962, the Lotus Skyliners played at dances, school proms, private parties, and even a bar mitzvah. They were one of the most widely recognized bands in the Seattle area. The Lotus Skyliners also toured the West Coast and played at temples in Portland, San Francisco, San Jose, Oakland, Los Angeles, and San Diego.

Within this group were Japanese American teenagers who were among the youngest people incarcerated in concentration camps during World War II.

Purchase a book, have it signed, and meet some of the former Skyliners band members. Listen to live music performed by the Pat & Rich2 Quartet.
