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Minister's Greetings

Did you know a very popular tourist destination in Japan used to be owned by the Hongwanji?

I am not very adept at history, especially Japanese history, so when I visited this site, I was unaware (or ignorant) of the historic connection to our school of Buddhism, Jodo Shinshu. And quite possibly, if you have been to this place too, you might have not known that a temple belonging to the Hongwanji used to stand at the same location.

This famous place which brings a little under three million visitors a year and was once a place many Daimyo (feudal lords) wanted due to its strategic placement is Osaka Castle. This famous castle which is now a wonderful museum about its history was once a temple called Ishiyama Hongwanji (Honganji) and before that an imperial palace.

Ishiyama Hongwanji became popular when Rennyo Shonin, the eighth head of Jodo Shinshu, moved from Kyoto which attracted many priests and followers. This coincidentally helped start the establishment of the town which would eventually be known as Osaka. Among these priests and followers were members of the Ikko Ikki, an army of Jodo Shinshu followers, which helped protect the temple.

Ishiyama Hongwanji stood for a little over eighty-five years with the last eleven years under siege. Oda Nobunaga, a Daimyo during the Sengoku Jidai or Warring States period of Japanese history, laid siege to the temple after unsuccessful attempts to penetrate into the grounds due to the strategic placement and defenses of the temple. The siege only ended when Kennyo Shonin, the eleventh head of Jodo Shinshu, surrendered the temple, but not before it mysteriously went up in flames as the priests were escaping. A few years later, Toyotomi Hideyoshi, another Daimyo, started construction on the grounds where the temple once stood and built the structure what we know today as Osaka Castle.

Since I first went to Japan, I have become more interested in the rich history of Japan and the Hongwanji. I hope in the future that if I am able to take a group to Japan with me, one of the places we will go will be Osaka Castle. There, I hope to revisit this place and enjoy the rich history with you all.

WRBT is fortunate to have one of our members, Anika Klix, facilitate a virtual meditation practice at 10 a.m. on the 1st and 3rd Saturday of each month. (Find the link: wrbt.org/calendar) Anika is a Certified Workplace Mindfulness Facilitator (CWMF) through Mindful Leader and has a certificate in Mindfulness-based Stress Reduction (MBSR), which was developed by John Kabat-Zinn in the mid-70s. More recently, she attended a week-long silent meditation and Qigong retreat at Spirit Rock Meditation Center in Woodacre, California. Anika shares some of her broad meditation experience with us at each session. This practice is a combination of guided meditation and silent sitting. No previous meditation experience is required.

We continue to have Meditation Services at 9 a.m. every Sunday led by Greg Watson and Ruth Terry and Wednesday mornings led by either Ruth Terry or Roger Fukai. These sessions consist of a 30-minute quiet sit followed by recitation of the Jodo Shinshu Pledge.

COMMUNITY SPEAKER SERIES Miri Cypers – Sunday, April 7, 2024

Please join us in welcoming, Miri Cypers, Regional Director, ADL Pacific Northwest, on April 7th, following service. Services at White River Buddhist Temple (WRBT) begin at 10:30 am.

Miri will speak to us on the work that the Anti-Defamation League (ADL) is doing to build stronger and healthier communities. She will provide a slide and a verbal presentation about the role of ADL Pacific Northwest. Miri's presentation will include time for questions and answers.

For over 75 years, ADL's Pacific Northwest Region has provided services and resources to the five states of Alaska, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, and Washington. Hawaii is included in the work of the ADL to combat antisemitism and hate.

Miri Cypers' office released a report in 2023, stating that antisemitic incidents were up 63% in the northwest region in 2022, with 65 incidents reported. This is the highest number since the Anti-Defamation League did its very first annual audit more than four decades ago.

Everyone is invited to stay for appetizers and desserts following the presentation.
